**WHAT THE "UNITED SONS OF CONFEDERATE VETERANS" MEANS**

There will be a meeting at the city hall tonight of the United Sons of Confederate Veterans, Troup Artillery Camp, No. 680, to perfect the organization and to transact important business relative to the work of the order.

Appropos of this meeting it may be interesting to know something of the objects and the scope of the organization:

**What is The U. S. C. V.**

It is an organization composed of the lineal descendants of those who served the Confederate States of America, honorably, in its armies and navies.

It is a patriotic organization, believing in the bright future of the South, and through the South, a greater Union.

It is a historical organization, preserving the history of the part taken by the Confederacy in the War between the States, and endeavoring to have the histories taught in our schools true and unbiased, reflect on whom they may.

It is a benevolent organization, throwing its protecting arm around its unfortunate members, and around the Confederate veteran, and his widow and orphan.

It is a fraternal organization, binding together for mutual help and work men with the proudest lineage the world has ever known.

It is an organization formed to honor patriotism, bravery, self-sacrifice and every other noble virtue.

It is an organization, non-political, and non-sectarian, but whose members are banded together for the upbuilding of the South, and of the Union, their protection against foes without and within, and the preservation of American civilization, and the regnancy of the white race in America.

While adhering to a complete belief in the rights of our fathers, and in the justice of their Cause, the organization does not seek to stir up sectional feeling, and gives others the same belief in the rights of their cause as we claim.

**Why Camps Should be Formed.**

In order that each camp may carry on its portion of the work in its locality, and serve as a center from which may radiate the activities of the general organization.

In order that the members may apply the principles of the organization in their section, may know each other, may have a common meeting place, the pleasures of social intercourse, historical education, and research, patriotic incentive and benevolent feeling.

That there may be in every county a compact body of men, composed of the best minds of the South, in order that peculiarly Southern problems may be studied and a solution sought and gained.

That there may be a benevolent center from which to radiate aid and comfort to the rapidly thinning ranks of the men who wore the gray.

**Why You Should Join.**

That you may show the world that you love and honor your father, and that the fight be prosecuted.

That you may prove that you do not look on your father as a rebel and traitor.

That you may give of your worldly gains a little toward making the pathway of some of your father's comrades less hard, or prevent the doors of the poorhouse from closing on a man who perhaps shared his last crust with your father in the days that tried men's souls.

That you may meet and affiliate with men who think as you do, who have a common heritage with you, a heritage of which you and they should be, and are, proud.

That you may apply personally and in conjunction with your comrades the principles for which this organization stands, and in carrying out its object, help to build up your section, to bind closer those of Southern blood and feeling, and be a bulwark of protection for the proud Southern civilization in the days when the regnancy of the white race shall be in the balance.

That you may gain fraternity, benevolence and patriotism in a single organization.

**Ideals and Objects.**

We will first analyze the name of this Confederation:

UNITED stands for the closest bonds which human brains can evolve. We are a band of brothers organized for a noble work. The word covers all of the relations of life between us an individuals and as Camps. It comprises a friendship, the peer of that of Damon and Phythias. It contemplates a brotherhood as noble as any in history, a fraternity as close as that of Masonry. It signifies that the bond cannot be set asunder without destroying the life, that they are as ternal as the hills. It means that one mem-

ber should feel it his pleasure and duty to help another, with means, if necessary, with advice if asked for; to be with him in sickness, and to perform the last services that one mortal can perform for another. This is the spirit of organization.

SONS brings to mind the human relationship, and it is needless to point out the duties of that relationship in their highest ideals.

CONFEDERATE brings to our mind the last white man's government the world ever saw, a government created to perpetuate the rights of human liberty for which our fathers fought in the War of the Revolution, a government jealous of maintaining the rights of the individual.

It tells of a government whose people died for it, believing that their sacrifice would preserve those rights. It comprised a government giving equal rights to all that were capable of partaking in the affairs of government and with justice to those incapable of so taking part. It names a government with no taint of graft or malfeasance on its officers, one whose officers and citizens were animated by the most patriotic purposes, the most devout sacrifice. It paints a four years' struggle against odds as great as ever confronted any warriors. It blazes the history of a struggle against the mercenaries of the world, against sufferings due to insufficient clothing, and dearth of munitions of war. It outlines a war in which evolved leaders whose tactics will be studied by the warrior until his saber is turned into a reaping hook. It created a flag which was the last white man's flag on earth, which did not cover wrong and corruption, and which was furled in defeat, but not in dishonor. It perpetuates a navy which swept a third of the merchant marine of the world from the seas, which gave to the world the first practicable iron-clad and the first submarine which did damage to an enemy's shipping. It tells of women as brave as its men, the bright gems of a civilization the highest in the annals of history, a civilization so grand and virile that the United States believed that from 50 to 100 years of contact therewith on the part of the African savage raised the savage to such a height as to make him worthy of political and social equality with any Northern citizen.

VETERANS are the ones who fought in that fight—your father and mine, men composing the most invincible armies ever martyred, men who fought in a hundred battles, and who never gave up while hope was present. It means the men who followed Robert E. Lee, Stonewall Jackson, the Johnstons, Bragg, Smith, Forrest, Wheeler, Stuart, Pelham, and a thousand men whose fame will go down the ages as the ideal of warriors. It perpetuates the fame of YOUR father, it means YOUR father, the private or officers in that great fight.

The objects of the Confederate are to cultivate the ties of friendship among those whose fathers wore the gray and followed the Stars and Bars and the St. Andrew's Cross. It seeks to gather the fast disappearing facts of history regarding the war in which our fathers fought and gave up their lives, and which can only be gotten from the fast disappearing remnant of those who fought therein. Such history does not appear in formal reports of either side. It intends to hand this down, so that the American of all time may honor the memory of your father and of mine, and not look on them as recalcitrant rebels against a good government; and traitors to their country. It seeks to promulgate the facts thus gathered, to place such facts in permanent and concrete form for study by you and your children. It seeks to enroll on the bright tablets of memory the name of every man who aided in the effort to perpetuate unchanged the form of government bequeathed by Washington and Jefferson, honored by Webster, construed by Marshall and who, reached its highest ideal in the Constitution of the Confederate States of America.

It seeks to care for its unfortunate members, to lend them a helping hand to better things, to throw its core and protection around the needy Confederate veteran, and his widow, and orphan, to see that his pathway through life is not too rough, to be with him at the end, and to see that his ashes are deposited with those of his comrades, and that the green of our Southland carpet his grave. It intends to make it impossible for a poorhouse to shelter a Confederate veteran, but will see that he is surrounded by his comrades and friends, in well-kept homes and given every care and attention.

It believes it to be its duty to assist in the erection of memorials to the heroes of the South, to mark suit-

ably its battlefields, and to know that the graves of our fathers have some marker to indicate that "Here lies a Confederate."

It seeks to instill into the minds of our descendants the truths of history, to teach our children the veneration due the men who wore the gray, and to lead them to a just appreciation of the causes animating our fathers in their struggle against injustice and wrong in government. It intends to erect in every state in the South, ay, in every hamlet, a memorial to the "Women of the Confederacy," a memorial of love which we bear to our mothers and an appreciation of their sacrifices and sufferings for their cause.

We are an organization, non-political and non-sectarian, an organization of MEN, earnest and capable, who feel the high honor which is ours to have sprung from men who fought for the South, an organization of men who love the South and who will work for her upbuilding and for her progress to that glowing future which is hers. We stand for the regnancy of the white race in our country, for the purity of our government, for obedience to our Constitution, strictly construed; for protection of our flag against an alien foe, and for the uplifting of our country to that proud eminence which will make it the peer of all nations in honor, dignity, justice and power.

The immortal Lee held that "Duty was the sublimest word in the language." It is our duty to carry out each and every object for which we were organized, and Sons of Confederate Veterans will not be found wanting.

**Fry Potatoes in Crisco**
